Sitting around with a few cobbers they related their stage and golf exploits in a rather exaggerated manner. They were in fact telling PORKIES


Two of the pigs drank moderately but the third little pig really got into it and made a PIG'S EAR of himself. Surprisingly his mates didn't seem to mind.
